Exploration Update

BBX Minerals Limited (**ASX:BBX**) ("**BBX**" or the "**Company**") is pleased to report assay results for diamond drill hole TED 015, drilled in the 2021 drilling programme at the Três Estados project (Figure 2).

Significant precious metal values were obtained throughout the hole, principally from below the zone of intense weathering (see Appendix 1). Results include:

2m @ 1.82g/t Ir, 1.55g/t Pt, 0.63g/t Pd and 0.18g/t Au from 30m

7m @ 0.85 g/t Ir and 0.99 g/t Pt from 38m

7m @ 0.87g/t Ir and 0.73 g/t Pt from 47m

1m @ 1.86 g/t Ir, 2.18 g/t Pt, 0.06g/t Rh from 59m

1m @ 11.52g/t Pt, 0.41 g/t Au and 0.12g/t Rh from 84m

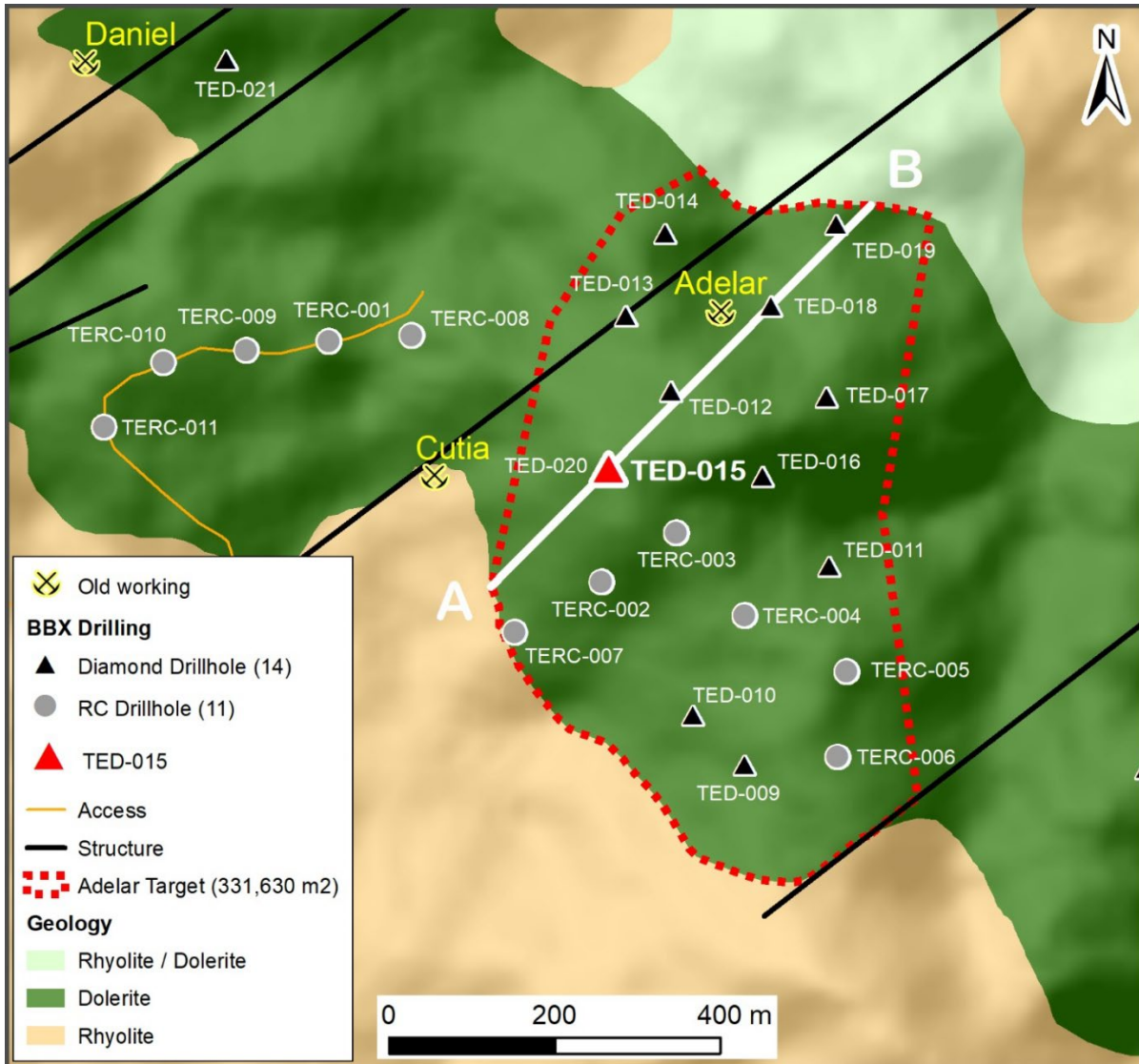


Figure 1- Adelar target drilling collar summary

During October 2020 to April 2021 BBX completed 31 diamond drill holes in its follow-up drilling programme at Três Estados. Au, Pt, Pd, Rh and Ir assays have been reported for hole TED 015 at the Adelar prospect (Figure 1), the first hole successfully analysed by the procedure developed in-house for this complex PGM/Au mineralisation). This hole was selected as it traverses the full profile of weathered gabbro, unweathered hematitic hydrothermally altered gabbro and unweathered weakly unaltered chloritic gabbro. The method utilised comprises a nickel smelt at 1,500°C, producing a nickel bead which is subsequently digested in HCl and the residue dissolved in 4 acids. The solution is fire assayed by conventional lead collection with an AA finish.

The BBX team has for some time been working on fine-tuning its analytical methodology, designed to assay for both gold and PGM's in a single assay method. The Company's technical team is now satisfied that the method developed, which yields satisfactory results for QA/QC control samples for all the precious metals, is sufficiently robust to enable full-scale assaying to commence. Following the purchase of additional equipment and strengthening of the laboratory team the assay throughput rate will be accelerated in the coming weeks. It remains the opinion of the BBX team that the assay method may benefit from additional fine-tuning. Investigative work on the assay method will therefore continue in parallel with systematic drill-hole assaying.

Metallurgical pilot plant test work is also continuing to define a commercially viable extraction technique.

Andre J Douchane, CEO commented: "*BBX is pleased to publish a fully assayed drill hole, and we look forward to releasing the assays of other drill holes on a regular basis.*"

Although the assay method being used is relatively straightforward, and determining gold, platinum and palladium values is not particularly difficult, the team ran into a series of challenges with both eliminating some AA background interferences and determining values for iridium and rhodium (an AA, or Atomic Absorption machine, is used to determine the final metal values from a fire assay).

These initial drill hole results indicate that the deposit has the characteristics of a platinum group metal deposit with gold, rather than a gold deposit. Since the deposit appears to contain considerable amounts of iridium and rhodium, assaying for these metals became necessary, and took much longer to perfect than

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BBX initially anticipated. The BBX team is now pleased with the resulting assay method that works well for gold, platinum, palladium, iridium, and rhodium.

Now, with the ability to assay various steps in a treatment process, BBX can press forward with determining an efficient processing method.”

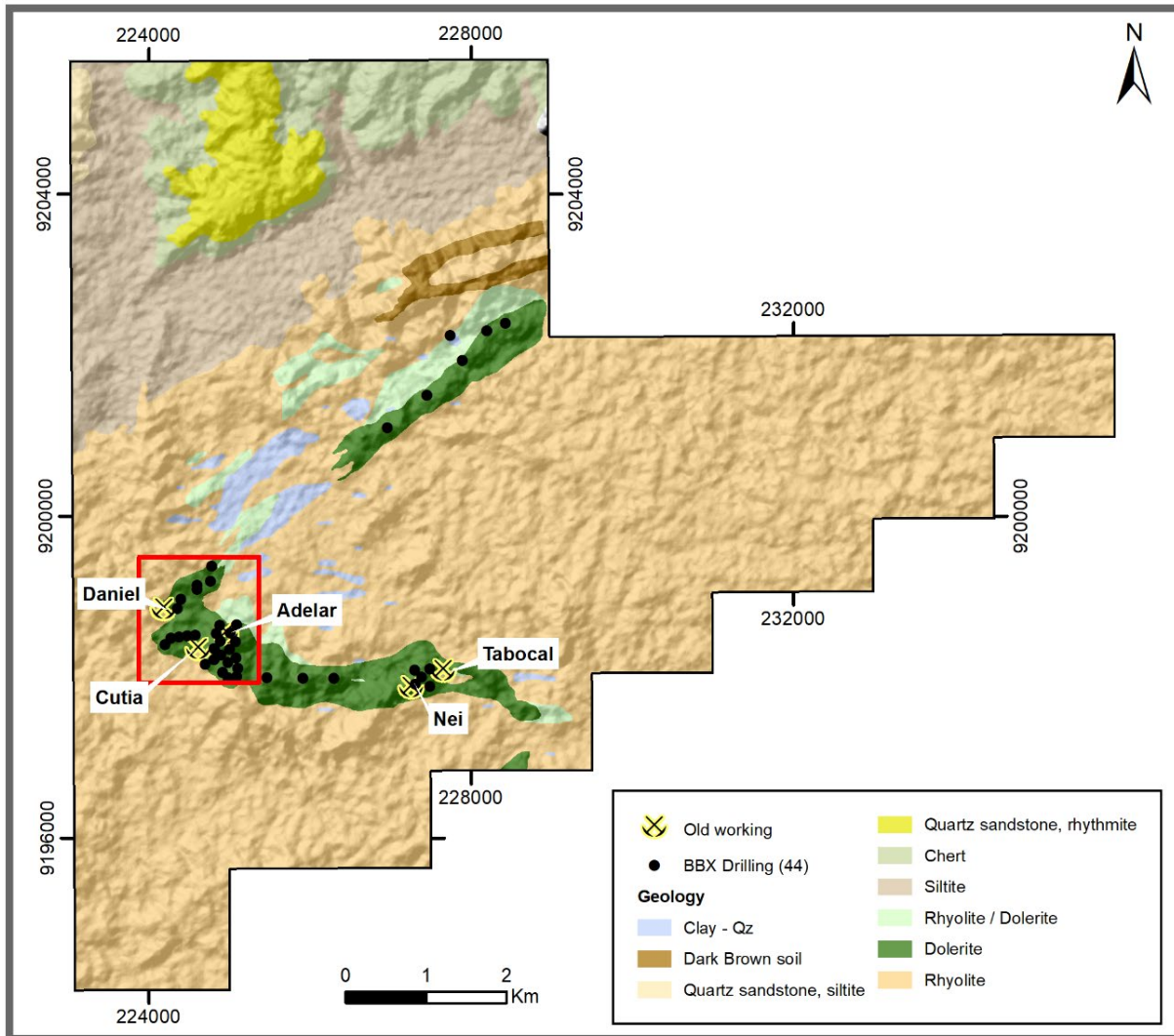


Figure 2 - Tres Estados project

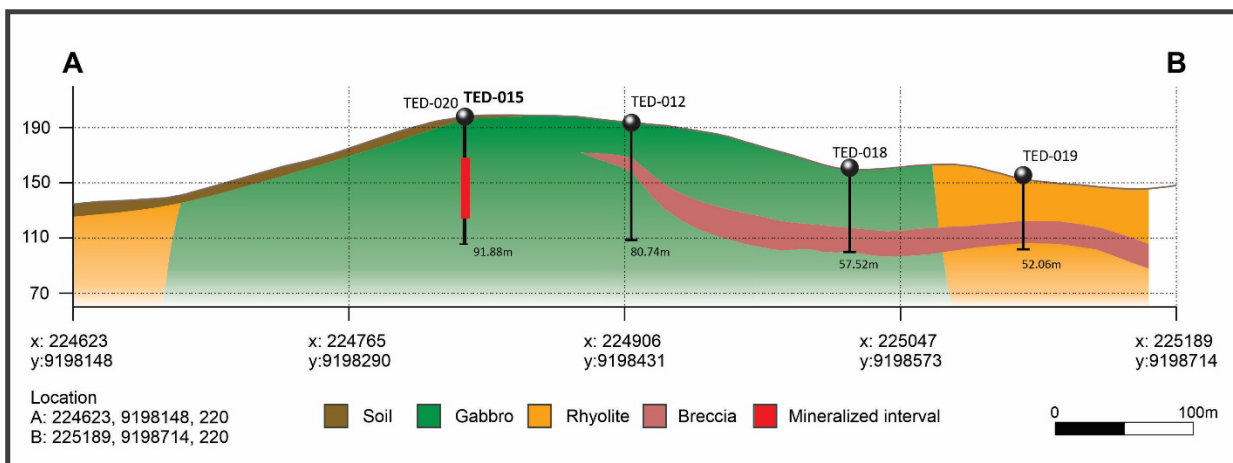


Figure 3 - Cross section A-B (fig. 1)
